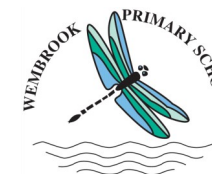


Wembrook Primary School PE and Sports Premium Academic Year 2021-22

Funding to Support Primary PE and School Sport



Schools with primary-age pupils receive PE and Sport Premium funding based on the number of pupils in Years One to Six. Each school receives £16,000 plus an additional payment of £10 per pupil. For us, this amounts to £21,400 (Autumn 21 to Summer 22)

The Sports Premium was introduced to fund improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils so that they develop healthy lifestyles. It is allocated to schools to work with all pupils.

Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision, including increasing participation in PE and sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

Accountability

Since September 2013, Ofsted inspections report on PE and sport provision and how schools will spend their additional funding. We also have to account for how we spend our money by publishing details on our school website and by discussing actions at a governing body meeting.

In setting the funding, as last year, the school is aware that the Covid-19 pandemic continues to have an impact on the organisation and planning of teaching during this academic year. For this reason, the school has decided to allocate more money than usual on resources and equipment, as it is anticipated that not all plans using external providers might take place.

All pupils work towards a Core Proficiency qualification. The vast majority receive Level 8 in Year Five and Level 7 in Year Six. As in previous years, several pupils were sign posted to join local gymnastic clubs.
To support pupils in being able to use their bikes in a controlled and safe manner	Bikeability Training All Year Six pupils are provided with bicycles and safety equipment. They are taught how to cycle on roads in an appropriate and safe way. A small number who are unable to cycle, are given the opportunity to learn	May to June 2022	£1250	Total cost £1,242. During four weeks in May and June, all Year Six pupils received bike training, focusing on road safety and traffic awareness. The training involved the pupils receiving approximately 4 hours tuition in small groups. All pupils passed the cycling proficiency assessment. A small number of pupils (9) who could not cycle or were unconfident were given the opportunity to learn. All were able to ride with confidence

The training was extremely popular with the pupils. Progress and development over the 6 weeks was very clear to evidence.
To increase the expertise and experience for the pupils in a specialist sport.	All classes in Year Three and Year Four receive tennis lessons at Nuneaton Tennis Club (six weeks). Pupils and families will be signposted towards Nuneaton Tennis Club	May-July 2022	£1200	Pupils have the opportunity to be taught by a qualified tennis coach at Nuneaton Tennis Club. All children are introduced to the sport and are signposted to how they can become junior members of the club if they choose.
To provide the opportunity for pupils to take part in sports, that they have expressed an interest in but can be difficult to access outside of school.	Basketball continues to have a high profile within school. The continual demand from pupils to be play, supported the initiative to purchase 6 professional posts. They were installed in concrete for additional safety. Some of the posts are at different heights so they are easier to be used by the younger pupils.	To be completed by the end of Sept 2021	£3408 Installation £1565	Basketball continues to have a high profile at Wembrook. On average during March 2022, 42 children played basketball every lunchtime. This equates to a total of 840 pupils being involved during the month. Basketball remains popular throughout the year, although there is some drop in participation when pupils are allowed to go on the field.
Sports Equipment is refreshed and expanded	The school has a wealth of equipment which is used regularly. Through wear and tear the school allocates a generous budget to ensure that there is appropriate equipment and that is in good working order. A significant amount is spent annually on keeping sports equipment (gymnastic benches etc.) in an appropriate condition for the six monthly safety checks.	Summer 2022	£2000	Sports equipment is regularly replaced and refreshed if needed. This allows all lessons and clubs to access the appropriate resources.
To increase the expertise and experience for the pupils in a specialist sport.	Warwickshire Cricket Board: Chance to Shine. All Year Four and Five pupils receive 5 weeks of cricket coach training. This culminates in two inter school competitions. Pupils will be signposted towards local cricket clubs if they express an interest. The initiative is heavily subsidised by Warwickshire Cricket club but the school does purchase additional sessions to develop the learning opportunities.	Summer 2022	£400	180 pupils played weekly during sessions. Individual pupils were signposted to local cricket clubs. For health reasons the inter school competitions did not take place.

Using local sporting facilities	Due to the location of the school, we are fortunate that throughout the year, we are able to easily access the Pingles Sport Centre to support additional sporting activities. This includes using the swimming pool, the athletics track and the newly installed netball courts.	Throughout the year	£2,000	<p>During the winter months when various lockdowns were enforced the use of local sporting facilities were greatly reduced.</p> <p>Throughout the year school was able to maintain the additional swimming slots which were first optioned during the lockdowns. The focus was on Year Five pupils who experienced very little swimming during the previous two years due the pandemic. Early evidence is suggesting that there are a significant number of pupils who have benefitted from these “extra lessons”.</p> <p>The summer months saw the school use the Pingles running track on numerous occasions. This resulted in the Year Six Boys athletics team winning their section of the area sports tournament</p>
Support teaching of lessons	<p>Cyber Coach. Interactive ICT PE warm up that teaches the pupils new skills as they warm up for their PE lesson, usually in the hall.</p> <p>PE Primary Planning. A planning ICT package which includes exemplary lesson plans including video clips.</p> <p>Mad Music. - The majority of school swimming lessons take place when the children are in Year Three and Four. As some of our pupils continue to take lessons after these school years the Year Six data is pupil generated and therefore can not be validated by school.
- This data is even more difficult to validate this year as swimming lessons for many of the pupils was disrupted during 2020 and 2021 due to the various lockdowns that took place.

Overall Conclusions

Another unusual year! The disruption of the Autumn and Spring term with Covid meant that there were various planned activities which either did not take place or did not have the profile and time that was originally hoped for. However, PE and games did take place throughout the year and there were positives to celebrate.

- 13 extra-curriculum clubs took place over the year. The clubs varied from netball to athletics, cross-country to rounders and football to dance. All were very well supported with an estimated 260 pupils getting involved over the year.
- The school football team came second in the Nuneaton Schools Football League
- Year Six boys won the athletics competition at the Nuneaton Schools Athletics tournament .
- The girls football team only conceded one goal in 4 matches at the Nuneaton schools football tournament
- Pupil participation in PE is deemed as high at Wembrook. Every pupil from Year Two up has received a programme of professional coaching in at least one sport over the school year. Physical activities has a high profile and pupils positivity engage with the many various activities which are offered.
